		All ships with a fixed toilet	For all ships with a fixed toilet sewage must first pass through a macerator which can't be bypassed before being discharged into the marine environment, unless the fixed toilet is a composting toilet.
		Untreated sewage discharge requirements	Prohibited Discharge Waters Illegal to discharge in coastal waters that are: a boat harbour a canal a marina a designated area
Treated Sewage discharge requirements	Prohibited Discharge Waters Illegal to discharge in coastal waters that are: - a boat harbour - a canal - a marina - the marine national park zone under the <i>Marine Parks (Moreton Bay) Zoning Plan 2008</i> Northern Moreton Bay Waters, Smooth Waters and Open Waters		
	Illegal to discharge Grade C Treated Sewage within ½ nautical mile (926 metres) of - a person in the water - aquaculture fisheries resources - reef		
	Illegal to discharge Grade B Treated Sewage within 700 m of: - a person in the water - aquaculture resources - a reef.		
	Illegal to discharge Grade A Treated Sewage in prohibited discharge waters - No other restrictions		
On-Board Documents	All vessels with a sewage treatment sytem are required to have the following on-board and available for inspection: - Sewage treatment system manufacturer's details - Sewage treatment system documentation - Sewage treatment system service manual - Sewage treatment system service records including maintenance and assessment documentation
